The school: Covington Catholic High School

The date: October 6, 1976

The time: 8:05 a.m.

We were there...

While most Notre Dame girls were in bed sleeping on this free day, we three Gavel reporters visited CCH to do some private investigating.

Having received permission from Sister Mary Virginia Ann and Mr. Jon Gross, we attended the school for the purpose of giving a first hand view of a typical CCH day.

Our experience began with the distribution of our survey (see p. 9) and the meeting of our guide, Mike Schuler, senior. Next we followed a specifically prepared schedule for the day.

The first things we noticed inside CCH (besides 550 males) were the bright designs decorating the entrances to the classrooms. Lab bottles and test tubes were painted above the chemistry door. Blue lockers lined the walls.

Upon our arrival at our first class, we were greeted by a person in the familiar colors of black and white. This was not a Sister of Notre Dame, but Father Fedders. We were stared at curiously by his freshman religion class.

As class continued, we searched the room to find a clock. Suddenly, we heard a noise which sounded like a doorbell. We were informed that this bell signified the end of a twenty minute period. At the sound of the third bell, the hour class ended. Aha! That solved the question of no clocks!

Hearing the flowing sounds of Mozart, we were lured into a class of art students. Peering over the shoulders of these concentrating males, we were amazed at the complexity of their projects.

Students at CCH are able to take art for four years, which enables more progress in development and preparation for college art courses.

As in the morning, the announcements were devoid of Brian Rutemiller, Student Council president.
