Back in the Spotlight: Students Return to "Normal Life" After COVID-19

A great deal has changed since the world first went into COVID-19 lockdown in March 2020. For Notre Dame Academy students, one of the most impactful changes has been the significant disruption to school life. For two years, our school community learned to be flexible, adaptable and creative as COVID-19 protocols were implemented within our school building. Our faculty and staff went above and beyond to keep students engaged in meaningful learning and our students were diligent in staying on track. Co-curricular activities were either canceled or drastically modified to keep students safe and healthy. Students often found socializing limited and particularly challenging. Our community paid special attention to taking care of each other and learned to be more attentive to mental health.

Here we are two years later, and although the COVID-19 global pandemic is not over, we are beginning to experience what some might call a "new normal." Due to lower COVID-19 incidence rates in our region, protocols have been lifted. Students are back in the classroom and once again able to fully participate in theatre, athletics, clubs and social activities. How are we handling this turnabout to normalcy at Notre Dame Academy - with smiling faces and grateful hearts.

The journey to normal life has been short and sweet for most NDA students. Eager to engage in dances, the spring musical, pep rallies and more, our Pandas have adjusted to our "new normal" with ease. That's not to say that they have forgotten all that they have learned these last two years.

Many students say that they have matured during the pandemic. They feel like they have learned to better manage stress and independence. Some have reported becoming much better at learning independently and developing important life skills. Most interestingly, NDA students note that they are more aware of the impact their actions have on each other and that they have new appreciation for their friends and family, the world in general and for their school life at Notre Dame Academy.

Lots of Smiles Over New **Mask-Recommended Policy**

In February, for only the second time since the COVID-19 pandemic began in March 2020, Notre Dame Academy students were not required to wear masks in the building.

With only two new COVID-19 cases at NDA that week and cases on the decline in the community, NDA moved to a masks-recommended policy rather than masks required. (NDA community members may still be reguired to wear a mask in the event of testing positive for or being exposed to COVID-19.)

Masks were also optional for four days in November, but when cases in the community spiked, NDA returned to mandatory masks the following week.

Mr. Rory Glynn's Publications students asked students and staff how they felt about the updated guidance. Here is what they heard:

"I respect people's decisions on whether or not they'd like to wear a mask," senior Erin Stegman said, "and I hope people can respect my decisions on whether or not I'd like to wear a mask."

Sophomore Sammie Poulos said not wearing a mask "makes it easier to talk to people and it makes the school feel more normal."

Senior Jillian Martin said she liked the new policy "because I really enjoy people's smiles, it makes the class feel more social, and we are talking to each other more. I didn't know what some of my teachers looked like without their masks. so it is nice to see their full faces."

Mrs. Erin Stanley, an NDA counselor, added. "I love seeing everyone's faces, but I still understand if people are being cautious, so I am being mindful about people wearing masks. When I see them wearing one, I will wear one."

Some students, like senior Kate McBride and sophomore Anna Neubacher, said they would continue wearing masks at school to help ensure the well-being of family members. "My grandpa recently had a high-risk surgery, and I want to keep him safe and healthy," Anna said.

Many took the new policy as a sign of progress

"I'm so excited to get things back to normal and have a great high school experience under typical circumstances," freshman Natalie Collins said.

Said junior Adele France: "I've been at NDA for three years and have only seen some of my classmates' faces for just over half a year. I like walking past people in the hallway and being able to see them laughing with their friends.'

NHS Works to End **PERIOD POVERTY**

This year the NDA chapter of the National Honor Society chose to focus its service on the issue of period poverty. Period poverty stretches beyond the lack of physical menstrual products and ultimately takes a toll on a woman's work, education, health and overall well being. At the center of this global issue is the stigma surrounding periods, which leads the issue to be swept under the rug while young girls and women across the globe continue to menstruate without the necessary products or support.

To help combat this issue, the NHS has been working with a local non-profit organization, Girls Health, Period. Girls Health, Period has a goal of ending period poverty and girls' absenteeism from school as a result. According to the Girls Health, Period website, over 35% of girls miss school due to their menstrual cycle. Girls Health, Period donates menstrual products, underwear and sports bras directly to girls from elementary school to college, as well as supplying schools, group homes, recreational centers and libraries with these products. The ultimate goal of the organization is to create safe places for girls to talk to adults about their menstrual cycle, because the first step to breaking the stigma is to start talking about periods, instead of shying away from the issue.

Brittani Gray, the founder of Girls Health, Period spoke at the January NHS meeting and members of the NHS became passionate about the goal that Girls Health, Period has to end period poverty. Members of NDA's chapter of the NHS worked together to raise a total of \$1,627.22 and 91 boxes of period products that will be donated directly to Girls Health, Period. This money was brought in through a bake sale during Catholic Schools Week and a dress down day on March 23 when menstrual products were collected as well. NHS is proud to be able to support women within the community and grateful to have had the opportunity to support such an empowering and meaningful organization as Girls Health, Period.

2021-22 Winter Sports Update



Led by team captains Megan Paolucci and Ella Weitzel, the Archery Pandas started their season in early November and have competed in 13 tournaments this season. In a typical tournament archers shoot 5 non-scoring arrows and 15 scoring arrows at 10 meters and 5 non scoring arrows and 15 scoring arrows at 15 meters. A perfect score is 300. At the Dixie High School Tournament, Ella Weitzel shot a 293 and finished first overall, boys and girls. In addition to Ella, Ellie Puglisi, Megan Paolucci and Keira Schneider had top 5 finishes during the season. Senior Megan Paolucci has accepted an Archery Scholarship at Thomas More University and will shoot for the Saints next year. A record 23 Panda Archers qualified for the NASP State Tournament and competed at State in Louisville on March 11.

The Varsity Basketball team completed the season with 23 wins and 4 losses. Despite the heartbreaking loss in the Regional Tournament, the seven Seniors completed their careers with a total of 89 wins. The Junior Varsity won the JV Regional Tournament and finished the season with a record of 18 wins and 3 losses. The Freshman team ended their season with 15 wins and 4 losses after winning the Freshman Regional Tournament.





The Notre Dame Academy Swim & Dive team recently ended their season, finishing 7th in the State Meet, tops among Northern Kentucky schools. The AquaPandas were led by junior Lainy Kruger who won two individual titles in the 200 freestyle (1:46.14) and 100 breaststroke (1:01.34), earning automatic All-American status and breaking school records in both events. Lainy was selected to the All-State team. Freshman Sadie Hartig had two Top 8 individual finishes in the 200 freestyle (6th, 1:54.34) and 500 freestyle (3rd, 5:04.43). Junior Riley Quinn had a Top 16 individual finish in the 200 individual medley (10th, 2:10.01). Lainy, Sadie, and Riley were joined by junior Sophie Anderson for two Top 8 relay finishes in the 200 medley relay (6th, 1:49.37) and 400 freestyle relay (8th, 3:37.53). Sophomore diver Brooke Hollenkamp finished 22nd individually with senior teammate Sydney Dierig finishing 24th.

The AquaPandas finished 3rd in the Region 7 Championships. Lainy broke the regional record in the 200 freestyle (1:47.84) and was voted Outstanding Female Swimmer of the meet. Sadie and Riley joined Lainy on the All-Region team. The freshmen finished 5th in the Freshman Regionals and the team finished 2nd in the NKAC Championships.



ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME Welcomes New Members

Notre Dame Academy will induct six former athletes and one former coach into its Athletic Hall of Fame on Thursday, April 28, 2022. The induction ceremony will take place at 7:00 p.m. in the Frances Kathryn Carlisle Performing Arts Center at NDA, followed by a reception in the Ann Buenger Alumnae Hall.

The scholarships range from \$750 to \$2,500. This year. NDA offered 6 renewable academic excellence scholarships to students who scored in the 97-, 98-, and 99-percentile on the HSPT and 16 benefactor scholarships based on academic performance.

NDA is currently in the process of working with alumnae families to create scholarships in honor of their parents or family members. Having a scholarship named in their honor is wonderful way to continue your own family's legacy at NDA. Scholarship donors are highly valued members of the Notre Dame Academy community. Not only do they provide scholarships to extend educational opportunities to students at NDA; they also create a legacy to preserve their names in grateful memory. These monies for your family fund are tracked separately, but are housed and invested within the Notre Dame Academy Endowment Fund. Each year, 4.25 % of the scholarship fund is disbursed as scholarships and grants or is applied to programming, as determined by the donor at the time of the gift. The remaining interest and future donations are kept in the fund, thus allowing it to grow.

NDA ALUMNAE **MAKE A DIFFERENCE** for Adults Living with IDD

Dr. Lauren Simendinger Wang (Class of 2002) is the Medical Director for the Timothy Freeman, MD Center for Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities at UC Health and an Assistant Professor for University of Cincinnati College of Medicine in the Department of Family and Community Medicine. Margaret Saladin Lunsford (Class of 1984) is a physical therapist but also the parent of an older teenager with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD), now preparing to transition into adulthood and changing health systems from pediatrics to adult care

Lauren recalls an NDA student trip to El Salvador as one that helped her realize she wanted to live a life of service but needed patience when Sr. Maria Francine told her "Vocation is like a flower, you need to let it bloom in its own time... let it unfold in God's timing." Lauren knew Sister was right. During college as a theology major at the University of Notre Dame pursuing campus ministry, Lauren decided to explore medicine and took some pre-med courses to meet the prerequisites for medical school. "My interest is in people and relationships. Medicine is just the vehicle for me to show love and live a life of service," she said.

In the 1980s, Margaret Saladin Lunsford knew that her NDA education had prepared her for her life and career. "I am grateful for my education at NDA, it was a solid foundation upon which my physical therapy (master's) degree and experience definitely helped me navigate the unknown with this child," she says. She also credits her gift of faith as one of the most important resources for raising her son, "The more I study the Scriptures and connect with the Almighty, the more blessed I have been throughout this journey."

Lauren previously worked with Dr. Tim Freeman at UC Health during her medical school residency years. She recalls, "The relationships he had with his patients with IDD, and their families and caregivers, were beautiful and life-giving. I felt joy when I was working with him and seeing his patients. I quickly realized THIS is what I want to do with my life!" Margaret, in turn, learned of Dr. Wang after a friend of hers who has triplets in the IDD program being treated by Lauren "recommended her with enthusiasm. I learned more and reached out to meet Lauren after my friend set up a meet and greet phone call for us." It was during that conversation in which they both shared their experiences in the special needs community and their faith, that they discovered they were both NDA alumnae.

Dr. Wang reveals that the IDD program at UC Health was created in the summer of 2021 and named to honor Dr. Freeman after his untimely death from cancer. Many children with IDD remain in the pediatric health system rather than transitioning to the adult system because "it is very difficult to find the degree of care coordination and specialized, patient-centered care our Center provides," says Dr. Wang. She explains that a collaborative primary care/behavioral health program which includes access to psychiatrists, therapists and behavioral support can help make visits more comfortable and less anxiety-provoking for their patients who have difficulty tolerating vaccines, blood draws or other medical procedures.



Innovations with this IDD transitioning population are exactly why Margaret reached out to Lauren. Margaret likens her son's transition phase to being "a fish in an aquarium suddenly released into a large lake. The transition team coordinates care and bridges the gaps between the different aspects of each patient's care. People with special needs often have overlapping disorders and sensitivities that make medications, appointments, side effects, and even a change of scenery challenging." Margaret gives credit to God for working things out beyond their ability and looks forward to UC Health's IDD program benefitting her and her son which will hopefully help him and others thrive during this transition phase with Dr. Wang's help.

Lauren's explanation of the delight she feels as a doctor knowing how her entire team at the Timothy Freeman, MD Center for Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities are able to help patients, families and caregivers serves as its own reward. "Many family members cry tears of relief and joy when they come to our office for the first time. They become family and start experiencing that level of care coordination and patient-centeredness that we strive to provide. Patients who have had previous difficulty accessing the system for a myriad of reasons are able to be welcomed into the adult healthcare system and have their unique needs met which brings a lot of joy to our team."

They waited until most classmates were in town for the Thanksgiving weekend to get together at Bircus Brewing in Ludlow, Kentucky on Saturday, November 27. They were more than happy to finally celebrate their 5-year class reunion previously postponed due to the pandemic.

PANDAS ARE BETTER WHEN WORKING TOGETHER

When Kim Gearding Roberts, Class of 1985, got the call from her daughter that she was helping those in need after devastating tornadoes ripped through Western Kentucky, Kim knew who to call on for back up - her fellow NDA alumnae.

Kim's daughter, Morgan, is an ESL (English as a Second Language) teacher of all ages at Bowling Green Independent Schools in Western Kentucky, as well as a high school volleyball coach. Morgan began her teaching career as soon as she graduated from WKU and remains in that area she loves. Many of Morgan's students are refugees who typically do not have much of anything, much less any food other than what they are fed during school. Kim recalls being introduced to very similar students when she first did her volunteer service at a preschool in Covington during her junior year at Notre Dame Academy. She remembers being sad and heartbroken to see and hear how many of these students were living with nothing.

In December after hearing about tornadoes spreading throughout western Kentucky, Kim was on the phone with her daughter. "Morgan said she and her dog went into her closet when the electricity went out and said she was never so scared in her entire life," says Kim. Bowling Green Independent Schools thankfully sustained minimal damage which was immediately fixed while students remained out of school from December 11 through January 3.

"The next morning my daughter called and said that one of her volleyball players and many of her own students had lost everything and several were now homeless. Morgan said she was going to use her own money to purchase food and clothing for several of her students. This is when I knew I had to do something for Morgan and her students because now it hit so close to her heart," recalls Kim. Many NDA classmates reached out to Kim the next morning to find out if her daughter was okay and asked what they could do to help Morgan and her students. "I cannot even begin to tell you how many Pandas reached out. I believe it was Peggy Collins Curry who told me to post it on our 1985 NDA page on Facebook and someone else asked if they could post it on their 1984 NDA Facebook page."

One of the most significant things that stood out to Kim was how guick her classmates and other NDA alumnae were to respond asking what they could do before she even asked for help, "They were actually the ones that made me think to myself that maybe I should collect my own donations for them." Kim thought she might be able to collect a few thousand dollars in cash and perhaps \$1,000 in gift cards, however, "I never dreamed in almost 6 days that over \$25,000 was raised, gift cards totaling \$8,015 and even a check for \$16,922! In addition to these donations, we also filled a U-Haul with clothing, toys, toiletries, and food." There was a drop-off site at Bowling Green Junior High School, so Kim and her husband Rick set up a table of donations where families could come by and get anything they needed.

Kim said she let everyone know these donations were going directly to Morgan and that she would be personally handing out the donations to her students and their families who needed it most. "I could not believe the response - it was completely overwhelming. I remember the first donation was \$100 from someone I don't even know. All everyone kept saying was "Thank you for doing this, we wanted to donate, but didn't know where they money was going." Rest assured, the students and their families in Bowling Green are beyond grateful for the generosity of Morgan and Kim, the Roberts family, and Kim's NDA classmates who knew how to make a difference in these young people's lives.

How has NDA helped shape you to be where you are today?

At UC Berkeley, I have gotten involved in the Green Labs initiative to promote sustainability in laboratories.

While she was in college at NKU, Peg worked as a psychology and writing tutor which gave her that first chance to make a difference in other students' lives. She says that she looks back fondly on her own "interactions with faculty and staff who helped and guided me as a student" and now she enjoys that same interaction with students "to guide and help them move through the challenges of writing a paper or learning material so they could pass an exam. I definitely think it was those experiences that served as a foundation for what I would ultimately do for my career."

Peg always wanted to help people so while she focused on her majors in English and Psychology at NKU, she thought about becoming a high school English teacher, school counselor, clinical psychologist or social worker. Less than a year after graduation, NKU hired her in TRiO Student Support Services as a Tutor Coordinator. She eventually earned her master's degree in education from Western Kentucky University while continuing to work with students at NKU as an advisor/academic coach. It was during this time she first began teaching Orientation to College which she still enjoys doing today. She advanced in her career to eventually become Director of First-Year Programs. Pegs says "it is very rewarding to be able to meet 1:1 with students daily AND be involved in administrative work that impacts the student experience on a broad scale. I didn't really plan my career; rather, I was fortunate to find majors which I loved, understand how those majors provided a solid foundation for anything I wanted to do in life, and have people encourage me to participate in activities and work that helped me grow personally and professionally."

NKU's UCAP program was created in 2009 and Peg explains its purpose is to "engage campus in providing wrap-around support for students to help them experience a seamless transition to, and through, NKU. It's a place where any student can stop in and get a question answered. We want students to know where to go and who to see on campus with little effort. Students can connect with us and others on campus to strategize solutions to challenges, enjoy campus activities, experience student success, and persist to graduation."

UCAP does have new innovations being provided for NKU students. For example, students who are struggling financially can now benefit from some 'last dollar' tuition support and UCAP helps align their academic goals with a financial plan to help overcome the immediate challenge that could hinder or even halt their progress to obtaining a degree. "We are working with our campus partners on providing a coordinated care approach to student service. Like in healthcare, NKU is committed to serving students holistically and working in a coordinated way to ensure students are receiving the guidance, support, and services necessary to make their NKU experience the best it can be," describes Peg.

When asked about the most exciting aspect or best success story of her educational career, Peg says it is not just one story or student. She learns about many of them every day, both good times and bad, sad stories and difficult situations. Peg proudly tells us, "Students inspire me to be a better person through their resilience and hard work. I see students every day who "on paper" should not have gotten this far, who had had so much go against them that graduating seems impossible. Yet they walk across the stage, shake the president's hand, and leave holding that diploma - the piece of paper that will often change their lives. To know that I may play a small, and hopefully positive, part in a student's life story, means everything to me."

Advice for Current NDA Students from Peg...

"Each year in high school prepares you for your next step and senior year is where your experiences and knowledge come together. Really engage with your teachers and classmates as you prepare to move on to college. Be open to new opportunities and give each college you visit a chance. Research the institution, visit, ask lots of guestions, talk to a college's current students, faculty, and staff. Be aware of your surroundings and get the 'feel' of the university. When you decide on your college/university, know how you are going to pay for it. College is expensive, it is an investment in yourself. Talk with people in the financial aid office about your eligible student loans and apply for lots of scholarships. If you can, find someone at the institution you feel comfortable calling or emailing with questions. It could be an admissions counselor or a friend's parent who works there."

Traci Menne Punch-Alexander, Class of 1984, Owner, Bunches of Bows

When did you first have the idea to open your own business?

It originally started because I wanted a hairbow to match all of my daughter Maddie's (NDA Class of 2007) outfits and I couldn't find what I wanted, so I started making them 30 years ago. People asked if they could buy them, so I would sell a few here and there. When Maddie was in kindergarten, a fellow mom hosted the first ever Bow Party and things really started growing. I continued to host a Bow Open House several times a year at my home. People eventually lined up early for the specialty bows because they sold out so fast. My first physical store space only happened because of Lisa Berger Pilger (Class of 1981). After hosting open houses together, she came up with the idea to open a store for the holidays. I truthfully owe the actual store completely to Lisa because I never would have done it on my own and she found our first location. She had her own business and I had mine, so we combined and opened in October 2009. The thought was to always close after December, but it went so well that I decided to keep going. Lisa was too busy with her children's activities at that time to continue.

What was the first location of the store, and how did you end up in your current location?

Our first location was in Ft. Wright by what is now Club Pilates and Studio Dee. We stayed there for 5 years, but I really wanted more visibility. Our current location in Ft. Mitchell on the corner of Orphanage Road and Dixie Highway required a rather large renovation so my husband and each of our children helped. We absolutely love it!

Do you have any thoughts or plans to expand the size of the store or open additional locations?

I think about it, but I worry but running more than one store. I'm inspired by the Kirn sisters (felllow NDA alumnae Melyssa 2007, Michelle 2008, and Christine 2009) who own "Grainwell." They just opened their second store in the Cincinnati suburb of Hyde Park. So, never say never.

Have other NDA alumnae helped you along the way? If so, how?

Jenny Corken (Class of 1981) set up our whole POS system for me and worked for a couple months helping me get all the actual business parts together. Our Bunches of Bows crew has always consisted of many NDA alumnae. Currently Judy Berger Collins 1968, Gina Meirose Best 1986, and Jan Steffen Hanser 1976. The many alumnae who shop in the store, share posts, and talk about it are so valuable to a small business! My family are the best cheerleaders including Mary Lynne Menne Koch 1979, Krista Menne Ross 1986, Meg Teipel Menne 1975 and all of my nieces. Peggy Collins Curry 1985 was a life saver because our youngest son was in 2nd grade at Blessed Sacrament with her oldest son when the store opened, so Peggy graciously took my son to her house during really busy times!

What are the best parts of business ownership and what are your biggest challenges?

The best part is being able to put family first - mine and everyone who works at the store. We love that we can be part of the community and being part of many celebrations large and small. My favorite is watching people grow up, hairbows, first communion dresses, graduation gifts, engagement gifts, wedding gifts, then baby gifts. The hardest part for me is to take time off. I'm always making things, ordering, planning, and trying to learn new things... I never sleep. The best advice given to me was to stick with it.

Can you tell us a story about how your store has helped someone who couldn't find what they needed anywhere else?

It truly happens all the time, and more often, it's just a matter of rushing the delivery of the item for us. We recently had someone who had a miscarriage and the baby's funeral was the next day. We were able to monogram two blankets in time, one for the baby and one for the grieving mother. It's a privilege for us that people feel they can come to our store during those difficult times, too.

What NDA classes and/or teachers do you feel helped you as you began to realize that your business ownership was becoming a reality?

It is definitely due to Mrs. Patty Raverty (Class of 1969). The store's many Facebook Live moments would be terrible without her! Speech class, drama class and more than anything, the speech team. It instilled a confidence in me back then so that I now feel quite comfortable in front of an audience, all due to Mrs. Raverty. I also credit my religion classes as I think daily about how we are treating people, what we are giving back, and whether or not we are making a difference. Granted we are only a retail store, but we can all do small things every single day. That's what we constantly saw from the Sisters at NDA.

What do you like best about having NDA's "Panda Perks" events at your store?

I love seeing all the people with whom I went to school, and those who also went to school with my daughter Maddie.
