Celebrating 50 Years

of Notre Dame Academy's Junior Service Program 1975 - 2025



The legacy of the Sisters of Notre Dame has always centered on four ideals: the

The legacy of the Sisters of Notre Dame has always centered on four ideals: the goodness of God, the worth of each individual, providing witness to God's love, and the need for education that promotes goodness and growth in students. In 2017, the Sisters of Notre Dame formally adopted these ideals as four educational principles to help guide Notre Dame Academy teachers and students in their mission for transformative education.







Well before the official adoption of these four educational principles, a group of Sisters the Covington congregation envisioned a program that would engage their high school students as partners in these key ideals through dedicated service projects throughout the local community. This mission led to the

establishment of NDA's Junior Service Program, which responded to community needs by building connections in the neighborhoods where students lived. For the past 50 years, every junior at NDA has had the opportunity to participate in this transformative program.

In 1974, Sr. Bernadette (Sr. Lea Paolucci) and Sr. Edwinita (Sr. Mary Rita Geoppinger), in cooperation with Principal Sr. Virginia Ann Cleves, established a pilot program in one junior religion class that paired two to five students with a community agency or educational facility within driving distance of NDA. Students would leave campus during a combination of their religion class and study hall to report to their assigned service agency and offer assistance in whatever form was needed.







The philosophy of NDA's service program is based on the belief that religion is to be lived, not just learned. One of the simplest precepts of Jesus' teaching is to love one's neighbor and to reach out to others, especially in times of need. Notre Dame Academy incorporated into its religion curriculum a regular opportunity to do just that. In the simpler, less complicated world in which Jesus lived, the needy were often obvious and accessible. In today's world of technology, rapid development and modern convenience, it can be easier to isolate ourselves. Reaching out to one's neighbor now requires an active and deliberate effort. Notre Dame's Junior Service Program is designed to give students the support, encouragement and opportunity to hear Jesus' words, apply them to the real world, and respond with love, compassion and generosity.

The growth of this unique and highly successful service program can be attributed to three groups who were instrumental in its creation and remain essential to its continuation. It is their vision, dedication and commitment to serving the local community and our students that have carried the program forward.



First, without the vision of teachers and administrators, the Junior Service Program would never have grown from a cocoon of ideas into a hands-on service opportunity that provides powerful witness to the teachings of Christ through acts care and concern. Leading the initial group of 30 juniors, Sr. Edwinita brought the program to life. From 1974 until 1982, she served as the program's primary administrator, overseeing student placements and conducting reflection sessions at the end of each year. Following in her footsteps as service coordinators were Sr. Mary Renee Nienaber (1982–1986), Sr. Mary Margene Koester (1986–1988),

Ms. Shelly Zeiser (1988–1995), Sr. Marla Monohan (1995–1997), Ms. Lynn Dickman (1996–2012), and Mrs. Bridget Price (2012–present).







Also vital was the support of the school's administrative team through the years. These leaders ensured that schedules remained consistent, worked with insurance groups to maintain safety, and supported faculty coordinators and students year after year. Sr. Virginia Ann Cleves (1971–1986) gave the program its first leap of support. Each principal who followed recognized the value of the service program and helped it grow. These principals include Sr. Rita Geoppinger (1986–2001), Sr. Elaine Marie Winter (2001–2011), Dr. Laura Koehl (2011–2015), and Mr. Jack VonHandorf (2015–present).

Second, this program would not be possible without the partnership of local agencies and schools. Their willingness to host and support our students each week has provided opportunities for students to truly become the hands and feet of Christ in our communities. In 1974, Easter Seals, Redwood, Prince of Peace and St. Agnes agreed to partner with







NDA in this experimental program. Fifty years later, the number of partner agencies has grown from four to more than 20. Current partners include Be Concerned, Blessed Sacrament School, Covington Community Montessori, Immanuel Sonshine Preschool, James E. Biggs Preschool, John G. Carlisle Elementary, Julie Learning Center, Madonna Manor, St. Augustine School, St. Charles Community and St. Vincent de Paul.

Finally, we thank our Notre Dame students for their openness and willingness to embrace the service program. Many service placements have challenged students to step outside their comfort zones, opening their eyes to the worth and dignity of every person they encounter and showing them how they can promote God's word and love to all. NDA students are engaged in many forms of service throughout the community, providing care, assistance and support to those most in need. They also serve as ambassadors and advocates for agencies in need of support.

In January 2025, the NDA community gathered for a schoolwide assembly to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Junior Service Program and to bless the juniors who will participate this year. Before students left the auditorium, campus minister Mrs. Bridget Price asked the junior class to stand and respond to four questions:

Will you promise to give all you can to the people you are about to meet?

Will you promise to put others' needs ahead of your own?

Will you promise to be gentle and respectful with each person you help?

Will you be willing to learn as much from them as they can from you?

Then, she asked them to bow their heads and accept the following blessing:

May your hands be guided with kindness, your heart filled with compassion, and your spirit strengthened with purpose as you embark on this service. May your time and dedication inspire others to join in the work of service. Go forth with grace and humility, knowing that your acts of care will bring light to others, remembering that you are Christ's hands and feet in this world. Amen.



With this simple blessing, the cocoon of ideas envisioned in 1974 continues to guide NDA students in bearing witness to the teachings of Christ through acts of care, compassion and service to those in need.

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
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Women Making A Difference

\$37,400 in Scholarships to Future

Notre Dame Academy has offered academic scholarships totaling \$37,400 to 18 incoming freshmen based on their outstanding performance on NDA's High School Placement Test (HSPT), which they took in December 2024.

Due to the generosity of the Sisters of Notre Dame and other benefactors, Notre Dame Academy awards several academic scholarships to the top HSPT performers each year. The scholarships range from \$500 to \$9,000. This year, NDA offered 5 renewable academic excellence scholarships to students who scored in the 97th, 98th, and 99th percentiles on the HSPT, and 13 benefactor scholarships based on academic performance.

Notre Dame Academy is committed to its mission of educating women to make a difference in the world and offers a comprehensive tuition-assistance program available to prospective and current NDA families. Notre Dame Academy provided nearly \$1 million in financial assistance during the 2023-24 school year.

"At Notre Dame Academy, we remain steadfast in our mission to provide an inclusive, empowering education for every young woman," said Mrs. Jane Kleier, Interim President and Chief Communications Officer of Notre Dame Academy. "Rooted in the charism of the Sisters of Notre Dame, we are deeply committed to forming women of faith, purpose and compassion. Through generous scholarships, need-based grants, our unique work-study program and a strong focus on accessibility, we are ensuring that the transformative power of an NDA education is available to students from all walks of life."

WOMEN IN STEM NDA Recognized with AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award

Notre Dame Academy has been honored with the prestigious AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award, recognizing the school's outstanding commitment to advancing gender equity in STEM education. NDA is one of only 847 schools nationwide to receive this distinction.

This award celebrates schools that are expanding young women's access to AP Computer Science courses and fostering a more inclusive environment in one of today's most in-demand fields. At NDA, that effort is led by computer science teacher Ms. Meghan Dooling, whose dedication has helped cultivate a program where students gain both technical skills and the confidence to pursue future careers in STEM.

By earning this award, Notre Dame Academy reinforces its mission to empower young women to lead, innovate and solve complex challenges facing the world today. Through a strong and supportive computer science curriculum, students are not only learning code—they're learning to think critically, collaborate effectively and create meaningful change.

NDA proudly congratulates Ms. Dooling and her AP Computer Science students for this well-deserved recognition and for continuing to break barriers in STEM.

Notre Dame Academy once again demonstrated the power of community and compassion during the 2024 Canned Food Drive, collecting an impressive 13,899 items to support St. Vincent de Paul—surpassing both the school's goal of 10,000 items and last year's total of 13,469.

While NDA successfully "Canned the Cru" from St. Henry District High School—averaging more than double their per-student total (29 items per NDA student, compared to 13 at St. Henry)—the Pandas came up just short in their quest to "Beat the Breds." Newport Central Catholic claimed the top spot with a remarkable 33 items per person. Still, one thing is certain: NDA students lived out the school's mission to make a meaningful difference.

The real victory lies in the impact of the drive. Thanks to the dedication of NDA's students and the leadership of its Family System, thousands of individuals throughout the Greater Cincinnati area will benefit from the generosity shown during this initiative.



2025 Winter Sports Update



The Notre Dame Academy Swim and Dive team wrapped up an incredible season as state runners-up, marking one of the most successful finishes in program history. Freshman Clare Herfel led the AquaPandas with a state title in the 500 freestyle and a fourth-place finish in the 200 freestyle, earning All-State honors alongside senior Sadie Hartig, who finished second in the 500 freestyle and third in the 200 freestyle. Sophomore Savannah Bien placed third in 1-meter diving, while juniors Liv Wallace and Danaka Tucker and sophomore Abby Carnes also posted top-eight finishes. The AquaPandas also placed second in both the 200 and 400 freestyle relays and fourth in the 200 medley relay. Earlier in the season, the team captured its third consecutive Region 7 title. Herfel was named Outstanding Female Swimmer of the Meet, and Coach Jamie was honored as Region 7 Women's Coach of the Year. The team also earned the Region 7 Team Sportsmanship Award. With strong performances across the board, this season proved to be a shining example of NDA's excellence in the pool.

The Notre Dame Academy Archery Team had a standout season, filled with growth, accomplishments and exciting firsts. Under the guidance of first-year coaches Craig Hoerst and Chip Boertlein, the Pandas earned top-three team finishes at multiple tournaments: first at Covington Catholic, second at Mary Queen of Heaven, and third at both Dixie Heights and Scott High School. Junior Ava Boertlein led the way with a sixth-place finish at the Region 6 Tournament, qualifying as an individual for the KHSAA State Tournament. Ava also achieved two perfect scoring ends this season. Teammates Reagan Carman and Sarah Beckham also earned medals for top-five finishes, with Sarah claiming top overall scorer at the Mary Queen of Heaven tournament. More than half of the team achieved career-best scores this year, and several archers consistently placed in the top ten. The team concluded its season on April 17 with Ava representing NDA at the state level. Congratulations to the entire team and a special thank-you to our seniors—your leadership helped make this season a success. We are so proud of our Archery Pandas!





Notre Dame Academy's Bowling Team had a fun and rewarding season as the program continues to grow. With 15 bowlers, the Pandas finished 7-2 in conference play and placed sixth out of 12 teams in the division. Sophomore Hayley Pelstring was a standout, earning All-Conference honors and representing NDA on the all-star tournament team. She made three consecutive all-tournament teams and set a new school record with a 178 average. At the NKAC Conference Tournament, the team narrowly missed a title by just four pins. NDA entered the Team Regional Tournament as the fourth seed and was represented in the KHSAA Regional Singles Tournament by junior Cami Norris, junior Ella Weber, sophomore Hayley Pelstring, and freshman Clare Pelstring. Senior Maddie Janszen was one of only four bowlers in the NKAC to win scholarship money from the Northern Kentucky Bowling Proprietors. End-of-season awards went to Hayley Pelstring (MVP), Norah Pilgrim (Most Improved), and Cami Norris (Panda Spirit). With continued growth and impressive performances, NDA Bowling is quickly becoming a regional powerhouse.

The Notre Dame Academy Basketball Program wrapped up a highly successful season with a combined record of 52 wins and 15 losses across all levels. The freshman team went 15-4, and the junior varsity team captured the Northern Kentucky Regional Tournament Championship, finishing 15-3. The varsity squad remained ranked in the state's top 15 throughout the season and finished with a 22-8 record. After claiming the 6th District Championship—NDA's sixth in the last seven years—the team advanced to the Regional Championship, falling to Cooper. Individual honors were plentiful. Riley Eberhard and Ali Mauller earned JV All-Tournament recognition, while Sarah Young was named JV Tournament MVP. Megan McGraw and Amelia Stallard made the District All-Tournament Team, and Sophia Gibson was named District MVP. Gibson and Maya Lawrie were named to the Penional All-Tournament Team.



and Maya Lawrie were named to the Regional All-Tournament Team. Lawrie also broke the school record for field goal percentage in a season at 57.4%. Gibson joined NDA's 1,000 Point Club. Several Pandas received All-Conference and All-Region honors. It was an outstanding season, marked by team success and individual excellence.



Notre Dame Academy's indoor track and field team made history this season with record-breaking performances and a sixth-place finish at the KHSAA Indoor State Championship—the highest in NDA Class AAA history. Nearly 50 athletes participated in meets beginning in January, and eight indoor school records were set, including two overall school records. At state, the 4x800 meter relay team of Norah Barker, Maggie Durrett, Cam Kirtley, and Kate Blettner placed third and set an overall school record. Maggie Durrett also claimed second in the 3200 meter, another overall school record. Other standout finishes included Kate Resing, fourth in the 55-meter hurdles; Barker and Kirtley, seventh and eighth in the 800 meter; and a third-place finish in the 4x400 meter relay by Addi Frondorf, Ella Long, Barker, and Blettner. The 4x200 meter relay team also made a strong showing. With a deep and dedicated roster, the Pandas used their momentum from a historic indoor season to launch into outdoor competition with high hopes and great energy. This team is one to watch!

viewership and sponsorship have increased to levels we have never seen. I can't wait to see what the future holds for our young women in every sport."





STRATEGIC PLANNING Builds a Strong Future for NDA

This school year, Notre Dame Academy launched a bold and mission-driven initiative: a five-year Strategic Plan titled *Rooted in Faith, Leading with Vision*. Designed to strengthen every facet of school life, the plan reflects NDA's deep commitment to its Catholic identity, its legacy of excellence in all-girls education, and its mission to educate young women to make a difference in the world.

The planning process formally began on October 1, Foundation Day of the Sisters of Notre Dame—a meaningful moment to honor the legacy that continues to guide our work. Led by Interim President and Chief Communications Officer Jane Kleier, with support from the Board of Directors and guidance from strategic consultant Mary Claire Kasunic of Partners in Mission, the plan is centered on eight key domains: Academics and Technology, Advancement, Catholic Identity, Enrollment, Facilities, Finances, Governance and Student Life.

In February 2025, a diverse group of stakeholders—faculty, staff, students, parents, alumnae, board and committee members, came together for a Strategic Planning Workshop that was both energizing and unifying. Together, they explored the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead and shared their hopes for NDA's future. Listening sessions are now underway, ensuring the plan is informed by the voices of the full NDA community.

"This Strategic Plan is a vital step in ensuring NDA remains true to its mission of educating young women to make a difference in the world," said Jane Kleier. "It allows us to reflect on our progress, assess our needs and set clear goals that align with the charism of the Sisters of Notre Dame."

The initiative is co-chaired by NDA Board Chair Jessica Rawe and Mission Integration Committee Chair Betsy Weber, who are working with a passionate team of Domain Chairs and Staff Liaisons. Each team is responsible for gathering data, facilitating discussion and developing targeted objectives that reflect NDA's mission and long-term sustainability.

The Board of Directors is expected to ratify the Strategic Plan in May 2025, positioning newly appointed President Lauren Hitron to begin her tenure with a clearly defined path forward. The plan will serve as a blueprint for the next five years, providing direction rooted in the values of faith, leadership, service and academic excellence.

Through *Rooted in Faith, Leading with Vision*, Notre Dame Academy honors its rich history while preparing confidently for the future. Together—with strength in community—we move forward, ready to shape the next generation of women who will lead with compassion, courage and purpose.



NDA Sung Throughout History

Throughout the 119-year history of Notre Dame Academy, students have praised its academics, sports and student life activities through a variety of school songs. Even though you find a variety of tempos in each song, from slow and majestic to a spirited cheer, the words of each song leave no doubt of the depth of affection and loyalty each student has held deep in her heart for her alma mater.

Students were introduced to the first school song in December of 1930. The song, entitled "N.D. Loyalty", was composed by a faculty member of the Notre Dame School of Music and was first performed by the school orchestra under the direction of Garner Reyburn Rowell. Described as receiving a standing ovation by the student body for its premier performance, an article in *The Gavel* states, "Perhaps the best test of the song's worth is the gusto with which the student body sings the chorus. It will certainly become a permanent tradition sung throughout the halls of Notre Dame." (December, 1930)

N.D. Loyalty

"We, the girls of Notre Dame, would her honor now proclaim,

For the truth which she has taught, in every word and thought.

Our loyalty will show, wherever we may go -

And may the years prolong, the spirit of our song.

Chorus: O Alma Mater hear our praise to thee,

We sing your glory and laud your victory!

O Alma Mater, Hail to thy great name!

And may we add more fame,

To dear old Notre Dame.

Through our years at Notre Dame may we reach her lofty aim,

With a purpose strong and true in all we have to do.

Our obedience stands the test in fulfilling life's behest;

And may it ever be, our proof of loyalty."

By the late 1930s, weighed down by the devastating effects of the Great Depression, many of the Academy's school events were cancelled or minimized and the school song was no longer used on a regular basis, and eventually faded into the annals of history.

By the 1940s, several changes had occurred which permanently changed the makeup of the student body at Notre Dame Academy. In 1934, the Commercial Division of the High School was discontinued due to a lack of enrollment and in 1937, the grade school was closed, and all elementary students were relocated to Mother of God grade school. Thus, the building on 5th Street became strictly an all-girls high school and a new spirit of identity began to grow. At the fall Honor Day celebration, students at Notre Dame Academy were introduced to what was announced as "our first school song." Entitled "The Heart of Notre Dame", the song was written by an NDA faculty member and found favor with the student body. When questioned as to why they liked the song, students often replied that they liked the music (because it was very moving) and the lyrics (because they sounded almost patriotic), but most thought that having a song written just for their own school made it "tops!" (*The Gavel*, November 1944)




