Chapel graced by old and new alike

Notre Dame's new Mary, Mother of the World Chapel was blessed on March 30. Here are five things to know about our newest space.

- **1. Why this name:** Last school year, students, faculty and staff were invited to submit names. Mary, Mother of the World was selected from responses from the whole school and honors the global mission of the Sisters of Notre Dame.
- **2. What's new (and old):** The distinctive, 11-foot Coesfeld cross behind the altar was created for us by Mazzolini Artcraft in Italy. The altar, designed by Mark Warnock, was made to resemble the cross, and its 1,200-pound granite top was taken from the old chapel. The ambo to its left has similar woodwork. The original stained-glass windows are now
- on the east side of the chapel to see the beautiful colors as the sun rises each morning. The smaller, clear windows on the north side will be replaced by stained-glass windows created by artist Claire Wing, who also is creating the Marian shrine. A painting of Mary, by Marian artist Holly Schapker, incorporates elements of NDA -- our logo is one of them -- into her work. We kept a portion of the honeycomb wall on both sides of chapel to keep a piece from the old chapel because many alumnae asked that it be included.
- **3.** How we'll use it: Morning rosaries. Grade-level masses (the seniors had one April 12). Team masses. Quiet reflections. Reconciliations. Campus minister Mrs. Price laid out some rules at an introductory assembly, among them no food or water bottles, and no gathering just to socialize.
- **4. Who made it possible:** The chapel, the final piece of NDA's Excellence Without Boundaries project, benefited from generous gifts from many alumnae and friends of NDA. Their names are on a plaque at the chapel entrance.
- **5. When is it open?** Now that it has been blessed by Bishop Foys, the chapel can be used for masses, but it's also open to anyone who wants to drop in and enjoy a few moments of quiet reflection.

Team-first Pandas win Orange & White!

For the first time, Notre Dame Academy has won the Orange & White Game.

Riley Crawford made three of NDA's six interceptions, running the last back for a touchdown on the final play to secure NDA's 35-14 victory Sunday at St. Ursula's Schottzie Stadium.

The Pandas' victory, their first in five years playing in the annual benefit flag-football game, was made possible in part by their determination and commitment, coach Mr. Strickley said.

The Pandas began practicing with weekly indoor workouts in January and stepped up their practices to six days a week for the two weeks prior to the game. Several players said the extra preparation made the team better organized and more of a unit.

That teamwork showed at halftime. With the score tied at 14, coaches asked how the players wanted to approach the second half.

"We made sacrifices," Clare Butler said. "We all came together as a team to agree to use our best players the most. We wanted to win."

Added Crawford, "The fact that we all had the same goal led to the win. We didn't let whether one person was better than the other get in the way of winning."

on Crawford's pick-six and touchdown passes from Rosemary Schuh to Danielle Rennekamp and Abby Dressman. Schuh also connected with Rennekamp and Emmy Ayres for touchdowns in the first half.

Equally important was NDA's defense, which shut out the Bulldogs in the second half. Brooke Watts intercepted two St. Ursula passes and Brooke Ziegler picked off another. Crawford's three interceptions earned her game MVP honors.

"Winning MVP was very surreal, because I felt like so many people deserved it," Crawford said. "There were so many people who played a big role in the win."

After Crawford's game-ending TD, Panda players and student coaches from Covington Catholic rushed into the end zone to join her and to celebrate.

NDA has participated in the Orange & White game for five years now, with SUA and NDA alternating as host. Previously, St. Ursula had played rival Ursuline in the game, played in honor of SUA alumna Natalie Bradley, who died from leukemia.

Proceeds go to Cincinnati Children's Hospital for leukemia research.

NDA had lost its previous four games in the rivalry, including 21-7 last year at NDA.

"It doesn't matter if we win or lose," NDA senior Sally Smith said. "All that matters is that we're supporting a great cause and having fun."

Nationals next for state champ Mock Trial team

In November 2015, students Ellie Kathman ('17) and Hannah Hammond ('17) asked Ms. Johnson if they could start a Mock Trial team. Now, NDA's team is state champions and going to Athens, Ga., in May for the national competition.

Back in February, NDA's "A" team took first place in regionals and at state, defeating reigning state champion Dixie Heights and becoming the first all-girls Mock Trial team to win state.

Competition was held at the Kenton County Courthouse in Covington. The team was honored at an assembly the following Monday.

"When they said Notre Dame Academy won, I couldn't believe it," said junior Mara Schutt of the "A" team. "Everyone in the courtroom erupted. It was awesome to see all our hard work and practice pay off. I will never forget this and can't wait to take on Athens with my team."

When Ms. Johnson was asked about starting a team, she asked NDA alumnae if any practicing lawyers could help coach. Katelyn (Conner) Mollett, class of 2008, stepped up.

With little preparation going into their first state competition in 2016, the Pandas still finished 11th. Over the past couple of years, the team has expanded, enlisting the help of more coaches, Amy Hebbeler ('09) and Emily Cooney Couch ('10) and forming a "B" team, which finished ninth at state this year.

"Hopefully one day, the two teams will compete against each other in the championship round," Ms. Johnson said.


