Pandas fall in final to nation's top-ranked volleyball team



On November 7, the varsity volleyball Pandas headed to the KHSAA state tournament in Louisville. After a big win over season rival Sacred Heart in the first round, the Pandas rolled all the way to the state finals.

The final vs. Mercy, at the time ranked No. 1 in the nation, went five thrilling sets, but the Pandas fell short of the title with close scores of 25-23, 20-25, 26-24, 19-25, and 8-15. Junior Hannah Colvin received the Best and Brightest Award, and seniors Abby Thelen and Alicia Von Handorf and junior Morgan Hentz were named to the state all-tournament team.

To reach state, the Pandas defeated Beechwood to win the 35th District and St. Henry

to win the Ninth Region. Madison Salkowski, Hentz and Thelen were named to the district all-tournament team, while Hannah Talkers, Salkowski and Thelen were named to the regional all-tournament team, and Hentz was named Regional MVP. Hentz also was Ninth Region player of the year, Thelen was NKGVCA player of the year, and Buck McCoart was Ninth Region coach of the year.

The Pandas (31-6) finished fifth at the Louisville Invitational, second at the Asics Tournament in Chicago, won the district for the fourth consecutive year and ranked as high as 10th in the nation and second in Kentucky.

This season the golf Pandas, both junior varsity and varsity, had many successes.


The varsity

SHANNANAGINS: A WALK FOR A CURE

"Being with Shannon Wilson is a humbling experience. She serves as an example and a reminder of what it really means to be a good friend," says her good friend, Marley Wallace. She will always go out of her way to make sure you are happy and she will do anything in her power to make you happy if you are not.

Shannon was diagnosed with a brain tumor near the end of her freshman year of high school and endured a 13 1/2-hour surgery to remove a tennis ball-sized tumor from the right side of her brain.

After the surgery Shannon has gone through many things including, seizures, headaches, and scar pain. Shannon has been so passionate about finding a cure for brain cancer that she has walked a 5k in past years to raise money for the cause.

When Shannon decided to form her own team, Team Shannanagins, for the Oct. 26 Walk Ahead for a Brain Tumor Cure 5K at Sawyer Point in Cincinnati, it really showed her how much support she actually had.

Fellow senior Carly Wolnitzek says, "I have never encountered a more inspiring and uplifting person. I'd say that she is the soul of the senior class and the best Panda sister we could have ever asked for."

Shannon's team raised more than \$11,000 and consisted of more than 250 walkers, the largest team in the history of the walk.

Shannon says that Notre Dame Academy, especially the 2015 senior class, has been her support system.

"Every day I go to school with the senior class to see 135 of my favorite faces. They go out of their way to make sure my day is better." Shannon says.

Shannon said she will never forget the image of turning around at the beginning of the walk and seeing the huge amount of people there to support her.

"Ever since being diagnosed with a brain tumor it has helped me realize how incredible this community is and I wish more people would see what I see."

"You're in unorganized territory. Township Thirteen, Range Seven. It's not gonna be on your map, cause it's not an actual town, technically."




