# Sister Mary Agnetis, SND: The Quintessential Servant Leader

When asked to describe a servant leader, one might hear phrases such as "one dedicated to the needs of others" or "someone who leads by example, not by mandate" or perhaps simply "someone who genuinely cares more for others than themselves." Robert K. Greenleaf coined the term servant-leadership in his groundbreaking 1970 essay, "The Servant as Leader." He defines it as a non-traditional leadership philosophy embedded in a set of behaviors and practices that place the primary emphasis on the well-being of those being served. He identifies the five most prominent characteristics as: valuing people servant leaders value people for who they are, not just for what they give to the organization; humility - servant leaders do not promote themselves; they put other people first; listening - servant leaders listen receptively and nonjudgmentally and seek first to understand, and then to be understood; trust - servant leaders give trust to others; and caring - servant leaders have people and purpose in their heart and truly care for the people they serve.

Although this concept might have been a "groundbreaking theory" in the 1970s, it was merely the way of life for Sister Mary Agnetis as she took the reins of Notre Dame Academy in 1906. Seeing the value of every person, practicing the power of humility as a way of daily living, always listening with concern, trusting her students and faculty to do their best and showing through her words and actions the care and love she had for all she met, was simply the way Sr Mary Agnetis lived every single day during her 95 years on earth.

Born in 1879 as Anna Frances Smith, she was the 4th in a family which would eventually number 11 children. Her early childhood was spent in the neighborhood surrounding Philadelphia St. in Covington. Baptized at St. John's Church, she attended grades 1-4 at St. Aloysius, after which the family moved "out to the country" and she finished her grade school education at St. Joseph in Cold Springs. Even as a young girl, Anna felt the calling to devote herself to the service of others. After graduating from St. Joseph grade school, she traveled to Cleveland, Ohio and completed her high school education as an aspirant with the Sisters of Notre Dame.

On February 2, 1897, at the age of 17, Anna entered the cloisters of the Sisters of Notre Dame. Later that year, on August 30, she took her holy vows as a novice and took the name Sr. Mary Agnetis. Two and one-half years later, Sr. Mary Agnetis pledged her life to God on January 3, 1900, as she pronounced her first vows as a Sister of Notre Dame.

After teaching grade school for three years in the Cleveland and Toledo area, Sr. Agnetis joyfully returned to the province of Covington in 1903 and taught grades 6-8 at the Notre Dame Grade School for the next three years. On January 1, 1905, Sr. Mary Agnetis made her final Profession of Vows in the chapel of the Notre Dame Academy and Convent on 5th Street in downtown Covington, just blocks away from her place of birth.

In 1906, Sr. Agnetis was given the task of starting a high school, to reach beyond grade school and continue the educational opportunities for young ladies. This "task" would define the life of Sr. Agnetis from that point forward and would start her journey as a true servant leader for all of the young women whose lives she touched. Appointed as Instructor and Directress, Sr. Agnetis began with 6 students in the fall of 1906 and built an educational leadership legacy spanning 68 years and beyond. "From the moment Sr. Mary Agnetis started the high school, she became part of the soul of the academy, so dedicated to its growth materially, spiritually and academically, that she grew to become the personification of Notre Dame Academy. Every student who attended NDA from 1906 until well into the 1960s has gone away with a part of Sister's personality, for these – the ideal of the Virgin Mary, the spirituality of vigorously living the Mass, the culture of the classics and the refinement of true Christian womanly living – are as much a part of the academy curriculum as they are of Sr. Mary Agnetis's life." (KY Post, Jack Wessling, 1960). In 1920, Sister Mary Agnetis was officially appointed as principal of the high school. During the next few years, Sister combined her love for leading and teaching the NDA students with her thirst for personal knowledge and self-improvement, as she became a student herself once again, and received her BA from Xavier University in 1924.



In 1924, Sr. Mary Agnetis gathered with her fellow sisters at the convent on 5th Street to welcome Mother M. Cecilia, the Superior of the Sisters of Notre Dame, as she officially proclaimed Covington as the newest province for the Sisters of Notre Dame.

By the early 1920s, under the leadership of Sr. Mary Agnetis, Notre Dame Academy High School had secured its place as the premier educational facility for young women, a legacy that continues to this day.

In 1923, the high school received full accreditation for high school by the Kentucky Education Association as one of only three accredited Catholic high schools in Kentucky. It received an "A" rating, which the school has maintained up to present time. In 1924, the high school was accepted by the Southern Association of Colleges and High Schools and maintains that affiliation up to present time. In 1938, the high school was accepted as a practice teaching school for Villa Madonna College's secondary education majors, with several instructors in each department certified as "critic teachers". And, in 1943, the high school received a "Superior School" rating from Southern Association of Colleges and High Schools, the first of many superior ratings received throughout the years.

As an educator, Sister Mary Agnetis's interest lay preeminently in forming the young teenager into the ideal charming, cultured, Mary-like woman. "Sister has always maintained that her greatest challenge was to so indoctrinate the young mind with the ideals of Mary that a love and admiration for Mary would make them want to imitate her." (Reflections from her Diamond Jubilee)

This school year, Notre Dame Academy adopted a new Family System giving students the opportunity to connect with other students across classes and grade levels with whom they may not ordinarily have a chance to interact. The Family System has been well received by students and is helping to create a more inclusive environment, promote the sisterhood of NDA and provide additional leadership opportunities. There are a total of four families within NDA's new Family System, each including six homerooms with all grade levels represented.

At the beginning of the school year, families were represented by colors - pink, purple, blue and green. Over the course of the first semester, students researched saints and voted on a patron saint to represent each family. During Catholic Schools Week, the patron saints were announced and now those saints represent the names of our school families and serve as inspiration for students.

Pink Family - St. Rose of Lima- She is the patron saint of Latin America and the Philippines. She lived a life of simplicity and dedication to the poor and was known as a woman of integrity.

Purple Family - St. Hildegard of Bingen- She is the patron saint of writers and musicians and is one of only 4 female doctors of the Church. St. Hildegard was a renaissance woman who was involved in art, science, politics, and was the abbess of her convent.

Blue Family - St. Joan of Arc - She is the patron saint of France and of soldiers. Joan was not afraid to listen to God's call to lead the French army when no one else believed in her. She held on firmly to her convictions when the people around her were trying to sway her.

Green Family - St. Gemma Galgani - St. Gemma Galgani is the patron saint of students and against temptations among other things. She experienced many health problems throughout her short life, but remained dedicated to the poor and had many mystical experiences.

NDA OFFERS \$19,000 in Scholarships to Future Pandas

Notre Dame Academy has offered academic scholarships totaling \$19,000 to 17 incoming freshmen based on their outstanding performance on NDA's High School Placement Test (HSPT), which they took in December 2022.

Due to the generosity of the Sisters of Notre Dame and other benefactors, Notre Dame Academy awards several academic scholarships to the top HSPT performers each year. The scholarships range from \$500 to \$2,250. This year, NDA offered 2 renewable academic excellence scholarships to students who scored in the 97-, 98-, and 99-percentile on the HSPT and 16 benefactor scholarships based on academic performance.

Notre Dame Academy is committed to its mission of educating women to make a difference in the world and offers a comprehensive tuitionassistance program that is available to prospective and current NDA families. Notre Dame Academy provided nearly \$1 million in financial assistance during the 2022-23 school year.

"At Notre Dame Academy, we are a community of lifelong learners with a strong commitment to academic excellence," said Mr. Jack VonHandorf. Notre Dame Academy Principal/Interim President. "In the tradition of the Sisters of Notre Dame, we are dedicated to ensuring an education that is accessible to all young women. We do this through scholarships and grants, our unique work-study program, and by maintaining an affordable tuition."

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# **2022-23** Winter Sports Update



The Notre Dame Academy Swim & Dive team ended their season finishing 3rd in the State Meet! The AquaPandas were led by senior Lainy Kruger who won individual titles in the 200 freestyle and 100 breaststroke, earning automatic All-American status in both events. Lainy was selected to the All-State team. Other Top 8 individual finishers were sophomores Sadie Hartig (2nd) and Claire Monahan (5th) in the 500 freestyle, and junior Riley Quinn in the 200 individual medley (7th). Top 16 individual finishers were Sadie, Claire, and freshmen Danaka Tucker and Olivia Wallace. All three relays finished 4th.

Previously, the AquaPandas won the Region 7 Championships. Lainy won individual titles in the 200 freestyle and 100 breaststroke and was voted Outstanding Female Swimmer of the meet. Sadie won individual titles in the 500 freestyle and 100 backstroke. Claire and Riley had two 2nd place finishes each and all three relays were winners. Lainy, Sadie, Claire, and Riley were selected to the All-Region team and the team was selected for the Outstanding Sportsmanship award. The freshmen finished 6th in the Freshman Regionals and the team finished 4th in the NKAC Championships.

The team traveled throughout Kentucky and Greater Cincinnati to compete against some of the top teams in Kentucky and Ohio. The AquaPandas defended their title at the Flying Turkey Invitational, won the Conner Cougar Classic, and finished a close second at the St. Henry Winter Classic.

NDA Bowling is back after a three year absence with a roster consisting of two middle school girls from St. Agnes, two freshmen, two sophomores and one senior. Our team consistently improved each week with practices and matches against the other Northern Kentucky high schools . The team put together some awesome bowling: 4th in the CCH team tournament out of 12 High Schools and 4th in the Region of 10 girls teams. First-year bowler and senior Natalie Lovell placed 18th out of 40 bowlers and 8th grader Hayley Pelstring placed 8th in the single regional rankings. The team was just as competitive in the team regionals placing 4th out 10 teams. Hayley Pelstring was in the top 6 in average with a 158, selected for the Regional all star team and was Cincinnati.com NKY bowler of the week



After losing seven seniors to graduation, the 2022-2023 Notre Dame Academy Basket-ball program returned a single Varsity starter in senior, Noelle Hubert, who broke three school records during the season. Despite the lack of an experienced roster coupled with a schedule that included games against 10 of the top 25 teams in the State, the Varsity Pandas finished the season with a record of 19-11, a Runner-up finish in the Lexington Catholic Holiday Classic, and a 5th Consecutive District Championship while ending the season as a Regional Semi-finalist. The Junior Varsity made it to the Northern Kentucky Junior Varsity Regional Semi-finals and ended the season with a record of 18-3. The Freshman team won the Northern Kentucky Freshman Regional Tournament and finished the season with 16 wins; 2 losses.



Led by team captains Ellie Puglisi and Keira Schneider, the Archery Pandas began their season on November 7. The team competed in 15 tournaments during the season. In a typical tournament archers shoot 5 non scoring arrows and 15 scoring arrows at 10 meters and 5 non scoring arrows and 15 scoring arrows at 15 meters. A perfect score is 300.

Freshman Ava Boertlein was 1st Overall Female Archer at both the Beechwood Tournament and the Saint Henry Tournament. In addition to Ava, six Pandas finished in the top 10 Female Division at multiple tournaments: Reagan Carman, Ellie Puglisi, Keira Schneider, Lucy Siegert, Kate Slocum and Candace Stallmeyer. The team finished 6th in the Female Division at the very competitive 6th Region Tournament and a record 24 Pandas qualified and competed in the Kentucky NASP Tournament in Louisville in March. Ava Boertlein won the Cincinnati Enquirer Archer of the week and Ellie Puglisi and Keira Schneider were both nominated for the award. Most Panda archers made significant progress during the season, shooting 50 points and in some cases 100 points higher scores at the end of the season than at the beginning. 50 grade school students attended our June archery camp and 500 archers from 26 schools competed in the NDA Panda Classic in December. 

When NDA alumna Claire Deglow went to work on January 2, she didn't realize that she would be part of the emergency medical response team responding to the cardiac arrest suffered by Damar Hamlin of the Buffalo Bills in a game against the Cincinnati Bengals. It was just an ordinary day for Claire who makes an extraordinary difference in the lives of others each and every day as a surgical trauma ICU registered nurse at the University of Cincinnati Medical Center.

Claire Deglow, Notre Dame Academy Class of 2012, did not expect to have a career in healthcare. Considering that no one in her family was in the medical field, she did not anticipate becoming part of the medical profession. As a student at the University of Kentucky, she was often asked why she chose a career in nursing and she would pause to consider how to respond. She may not have had the answer right away but after taking prerequisite courses her freshman year, she knew without a doubt why she wanted pursue a career in nursing. Claire was interested in learning and fascinated by how the human body and all its complexities work. Claire said, "The personal satisfaction that I feel when helping someone in an uncertain and scary situation is compelling. I feel so grateful to have landed in a career that I love and am so passionate about." Claire graduated from the University of Kentucky in 2016 and is currently in the Doctors of Nursing Practice (DNP) at University of Cincinnati College of Nursing.

Claire's family and friends, especially her mom, Natalie Foltz Deglow, NDA Class of 1982, have encouraged and supported her by telling her how proud they are of the work she is doing. Claire's family has quite a legacy of women who have been educated to make a difference in the world. In addition to Claire's mother being an NDA graduate, both of Claire's grand-mothers attended NDA: Carole Moser Foltz 1957 and Nancy Klug Deglow 1958. She has several aunts who are graduates of Notre Dame Academy as well: Andrea Foltz 1980, Stephanie Foltz Reid 1985, Amy Foltz Chapman 1988 and Lindsey Foltz Llink 2000. Claire's sister, Paige, also graduated from NDA in 2016.

As a surgical trauma ICU registered nurse at UC Medical Center, Claire has made quite a difference in the lives of her patients and their families. Due to the nature of her work, she sees people in some of life's most difficult circumstances, often dealing with life or death situations. In addition to helping her patients and their families navigate through various medical scenarios, Claire also tends to their emotional needs which often take a toll on them.

Claire's everyday life as a nurse is a life of service to others and not typically the focus of attention; however, she and her team at UC Medical Center found themselves in the public eye earlier this year. As the incredible medical personnel that cared for NFL player Damar Hamlin after he suffered sudden cardiac arrest during the Bengals and Buffalo Bills game, Claire and her co-workers, collectively called "Team Damar", found themselves in the spotlight. Hamlin spent nearly a week at UC Medical Center prior to heading back to Buffalo, where he spent a couple more days in the hospital before being released. Thanks to the exceptional medical care he received, he has made steady progress in what will be a long recovery.

Along with the entire medical care team, Claire was honored at the NFL Awards Ceremony and Super Bowl LVII in Phoenix, Arizona in February for her heroic efforts to save Damar Hamlin's life. Claire reflected on the recent experiences and said, "I am so incredibly proud of the recovery Damar Hamlin made and is continuing to make. My job is always very stressful, but it can be very rewarding. This was exactly one of those times. I work with some of the best people at UC Medical Center and it was so great to see such incredible teamwork and this helped lessen the stress of the situation." Thank you Claire for being a servant leader and making a difference in the lives of your patients!

# Kelly Edmondson Simpson, Class of 1991, Owner Glencoe General Store

## When did you first have the idea to open your own business?

During the 127 Yard Sale in 2018 my husband and I drove past the Glencoe General Store which had been closed and abandoned for four years. I commented that someone should do something with that historic building. I've always had the idea of opening some sort of a farmer's market, and this building in Glencoe seemed to be the perfect opportunity to start my second career. We closed on the property four months later, and after a 21-month extensive rehab we were open for business!

#### What took you to Glencoe, KY?

My dad is originally from Glencoe and my family and I spent many years riding horses along the Eagle Creek, which runs behind the store. My grandma, Kathryn Edmondson actually worked in the Glencoe General Store when I was younger. Interestingly enough, several of my last years of teaching were also in Gallatin County, which afforded the opportunity for my former students to become employees! Glencoe is a town steeped in history, and being a part of its continued development makes us want to live and work in this community.

## What are the best parts of business ownership/entrepreneurship? What are your biggest challenges?

Entrepreneurship is the freedom to be in charge of my own destiny. There is no ceiling or limit to what can be accomplished. My passions and creativity are directly infused into my business every day. For me, this is the greatest benefit of being a business owner. The challenge is finding the balance between work and home life. I am learning that having the proper employees in place is what makes this balance more feasible.

# What NDA classes and/or teachers do you feel helped you as you began to realize your business ownership was becoming a reality?

Graduating from Notre Dame 32 years ago, I still recall the teachings of two instrumental teachers who helped shape my future career paths. Mr. Ron Greife had a love for history and taught with passion through storytelling. He created an excitement in me to further study arts and humanities in college. Ms. Heather Diaz, my senior psychology teacher, was one of the most compelling teachers in all my years of education. She taught me that understanding people's behavior will help predict future behavior. This lesson was key to my success as a teacher, and now operating a store. NDA gave me the confidence to explore my passions and dreams, and achieve my reality of being a business owner.

#### What is the best advice you received throughout your business ownership journey?

The best advice that I've received is to use the education from my mistakes and failures of today to become part of my successes of tomorrow. I've learned to never stop listening to my employees, customers, and community, for they are the reason I'm in business!





# ALUMNAE MENTORING

The Alumnae Mentor Program, now in its 6th year, pairs juniors and seniors with an alumnae mentor who works in the career field that each student is interested in pursuing. 
