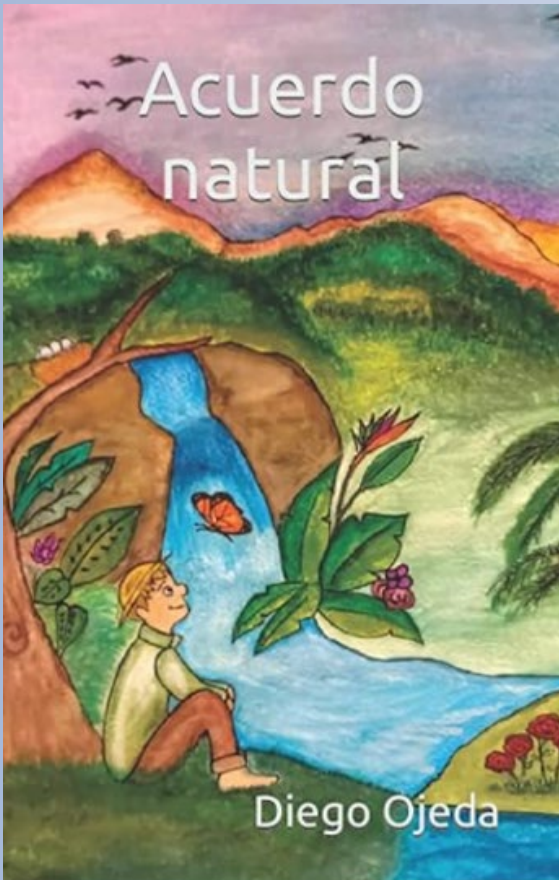


Serving as an AP Reader is widely regarded as one of the most impactful learning experiences for AP educators. Our teachers will gain firsthand experience in applying official AP rubrics, and this deep dive into the assessment process provides invaluable insight into student performance. Beyond refining their assessment skills, our AP Readers will gain exposure to student responses from across the country, offering a unique opportunity to understand the strengths and weaknesses of student work on a national level and how these trends may inform their own instructional practice.

GRANT-FUNDED BOOKS

SPANISH STUDENTS ENGAGE WITH POETRY



At the end of last year, the Spanish Department received a grant to purchase supplementary materials for enrichment. With the \$500 from Vista Higher Learning, we purchased two classroom sets of poetry books. What made these books so unique is that they were written by Diego Ojeda, a native Colombia, who teaches at a school in Louisville, KY. In fact, Ms. Stacey Bill and Sr. Maria Francine both attended a workshop earlier this year in which Mr. Ojeda talked about various teaching methods. One of the books is called *Acuerdo Natural* and is about appreciation and respect for nature. Since the Spanish 3 classes were learning vocabulary related to ecology and the environment, the topic of the book was very pertinent. First, each pair of students studied the poem they were randomly given. They prepared to read the poem out loud to the class, state its main idea, and answer a question about the poem. In this way, students were actually given printed material and saw their vocabulary in use. The exercise stretched them because of the nature of poetic thought. Yet it was impressive to see that, after less than three years, students were able to comprehend ideas of a complex nature in a second language. It encouraged the students to see that the words and ideas about which they were learning were in published form!

DEBATING ENVIRONMENTAL LAWS IN SPANISH

This past week Spanish 4/Dual Credit researched two environmental laws, one from Mexico and one from Spain, and did a debate. The students had to research the laws then decide whether they wanted to argue in favor or against the law. They did a fantastic job staying in the target language for their debates! They made signs and prepared well by studying both sides' arguments and perspectives. Senior Julianna Shriver stated afterward, "The Spanish debate was a very new and exciting experience! I enjoyed being put outside of my comfort zone, while testing the knowledge I have learned over the course of four years at NDA."

WORKING TO STAY HEALTHY

ATTENDANCE POLICY REVIEW!

It has become very apparent that our community is being hit drastically by the flu epidemic, stomach virus, COVID, and other easily transferable sicknesses. We appreciate the continued support of all of you with regard to keeping students home when it is suspected that she is ill. Thank you for being proactive to prevent the continuous spread of these illnesses.

Our students have a generous number of unexcused absences that are permitted. Students can accumulate sixteen unexcused absences for a full year course and eight for a half year course. Please continue to monitor how your daughter is feeling and we will be glad to work with you if she needs to stay home. A few parents have asked about the policy for make-up work and while there is not a definitive policy in the handbook regarding this, the teachers are always understanding and flexible. The Student Services Team (Guidance Counselors) can also help with assignment tracking if students miss a lot of days in a row. This seemed like the perfect time for this reminder!

In addition, please remind your daughters that our nurses are here daily to assist them with any health concerns they might have. If she is not feeling well, she is to report to the nurse who can help to guide her in going home, resting at school for a bit, taking medication, etc. Please encourage your daughter not to contact you directly unless she has visited the nurse.

NDA'S HOPE SQUAD LEADS A WEEK OF POSITIVITY AND CONNECTION

This past week NDA's Hope Squad celebrated Hope Week. Hope Squad is a peer to peer suicide prevention group where peer-nominated members are trained to note signs of distress and reach out, connecting peers to help and hope. Hope Squad's mission is to educate the entire student body to reduce stigma and change their school's culture. This week, Hope Squad hosted various activities to help students prioritize self-care, connection, and support.

Monday, the Hope Squad served root beer floats at lunch letting students know Hope Squad is "rooting for you"! Tuesday, there was a Hope Heart scavenger hunt to provide facts about mental health and suicide prevention. On Wednesday, Hope Squad promoted a simple yet powerful way to spread positivity by "clipping" peers with clothespins that included positive messages to pass along to friends. Thursday the Hope Squad promoted the importance of generosity and raised \$1,349.50 for the DCCH HALO program and Hope Squad with an out of uniform day. Friday, students were encouraged to write a Valentine for a friend so others can know that they are important and they matter.

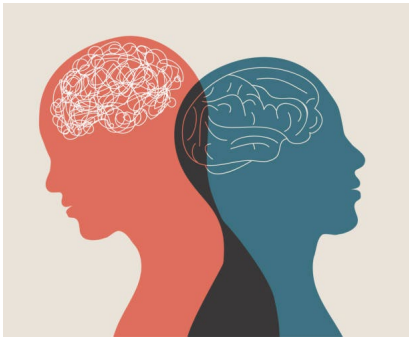

NDA HOSTS COLLEGE INFORMATION NIGHT FOR PARENTS

Thursday, March 27 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., Notre Dame Academy is hosting a College Information Night for the next **Panda Parent Club Meeting**, available to all NDA and CCH parents. The event will include three different presentations with various topics such as career exploration, financing post secondary education, and college preparation. Jennie LaMothe and Lorraine O'Moore from Learning Grove will be presenting on how to support your student in exploring post secondary options and career planning. BREAKING THE SILENCE

NDA PRIORITIZES MENTAL HEALTH AND SUICIDE PREVENTION

Suicide is the second leading cause of death for youth ages 10-24. There are three female suicide attempts for every male attempt. Twenty percent of youth ages 13-18 live with a mental illness. These shocking numbers show why talking about mental health and suicide prevention is of the utmost importance. Every year, each student at NDA receives Suicide Prevention during a grade level meeting or classroom presentation. Students are encouraged to reach out to a parent, member of Hope Squad, or a safe adult in the building if they, or someone they know, is struggling. The counselors are always available to help support students and partner with parents to ensure the well being and safety of students.

Suicide Prevention Resources

Q.P.R. is an emergency response framework for supporting someone in a mental health crisis. Participants in this training learn how to question a person about suicide, persuade someone to get help, and refer someone to appropriate resources. It is designed to train anyone who is in a position to prevent suicide, including parents, teachers, caregivers, mentors, and coaches.
